Curricular Learning Targets:

Connections with community

- ways to contribute to community and society that take cultural influences into consideration
- value of volunteerism for self and community
- inclusive practices, including taking different worldviews and diverse perspectives into consideration
- personal networking and employment marketing strategies
- factors that both inform career-life choices and are influenced by them, including personal, environmental, and land use factors

To begin, highlight the the main words in the above learning targets. What NOUNS did you identify? This task builds the skill of asking questions, an essential — yet often overlooked — lifelong learning skill that allows people to think critically, feel greater power and self-efficacy, and become more confident and ready to participate in civic life.

There are four essential rules for producing questions:

- Ask as many questions as you can.
- Do not stop to discuss, judge, or answer the questions.
- Write down every question exactly as it is stated.
- Change any statement into a question.

School Based Ideas

- Organize or get involved in a school food drive. Advertise, plan, and run, including accounting for distributing/delivering food.
- Collect cold-weather essentials for students/families. What items are most needed, range of sizes, a way to collect and store the clothing until it can be distributed.
- Donate your fashionable threads to students and their families.
- Donate/Recycle old phones and other tech to groups in need.
- Hygiene kits for students of CSS
- Develop a new club for students at CSS or host an activity to build community and culture

Community Based Ideas

• Research a local charity that interests you. Connect with and plan ways you can support their charity work. (Food bank, Better Beginnings, Chilliwack Community Services, Meadow Rose Society, Pride, StarFish, etc.)

- Connect with clubs, schools, YMCA, to find out who is need, what they are looking for.
- Collect goods and raise funds to help athletes in financial need.
- Spring forward with a tree-planting extravaganza or community garden project
- Spread joy through the power of books: donate to a classroom, library, or donate to local charity.

- Trash Pandas
- Support a refugee/immigrant family
- Support Animals in Need: BCSPCA
- Support our elders: Nursing home visits

Project Plan

As this project goes into June and assessment/feedback will be ongoing, you will wrap up your learning journey for this project as well as other projects in a final Reflective Learning Interview (RLI). This will be done in two parts if you worked with others (we will discuss the experience, how you feel it went, the challenges you faced, and how your work benefitted the community) as well as doing an individual RLI to discuss the entire semester.
